

Administrative Jurisdiction and “e-Justice”

The advantages of modern information and communication technologies are increasingly being used in EU Member States' judicial systems. Decision-makers in all EU countries have already looked into the question of "e-Justice", and in many Member States a legal framework permitting the use of modern technologies in the judicial system is already in place.

Given the multiplicity of judicial systems in the EU, there are inevitably many different concepts of e-Justice. At present, it is very difficult to give a comprehensive overview of the main technical concepts used within the Member States' judicial systems. The purpose of this survey is to obtain a picture of the present situation not mainly on a country-wide level, but to obtain information about the e-Justice developments within the member organisations of the Association of the Councils of State and Supreme Administrative Jurisdictions of the European Union. It is also an opportunity for the High Courts to learn about the experience of others.
